NR 268.5: Feb. 4, 1848

P.T. Kalaeokekoi claims:

Laupahoehoe [2], ahupuaa in Hamakua;
 Kamakela, ili no Honolulu;

1 pahale at Kamakela;

1 pahale "maloko ke kulanakauhale" ("within the village/town") of
 Lahaina [Makalaukalo of Hanakapuaa below].

Ukalimoa [?Kapokini's father] said that I was to be above (maluna) in
 the lot and Kapokini was to be below (malalo) me, and that I was to care
 for (malama) him until he was old. Nakookoo [w., Kapokini's wife and
 mother of Kalakini, w., Kalaeokekoi's 1/2 sister] ordered Kalakini and me
 to enter (ho'okomo) the pahale on the south eastern side of the enclosure
 [called] Kelewea [in my name].

[Claim continues:] 1 pahale in Nuuanu, just in front of the place of
 the King [in Kamakela?].

NT 236.10 16 June 1853:

Pahale at Makalaukalo of Hanakapuaa in Lahaina; lot to Keaka and
 husband in 1839; Kalaeokekoi is keiki [true son, by Kapokini] to Keaka;
 registered land in his name for Keaka. Kalaeokekoi has died... land
 awarded to "Kalaeokekoi for Keaka"

NT 241.10 "True copy" of Mahele Book 8 July 1853. A.G. Thurston

NT 763.3 kue (versus) K/A John Stevenson (LCA 11029)

John Young, witness, knows Kalaeokekoi's land Kamakela. Says
 Kalaeokekoi died 21 October 1849. Does not know if Stevenson had it.
 Kapokini received it--when he went away with Boki he left it to Haalilio
 [his kaikaina]. Haalilio, when he went [abroad in 1843] left it to the
 King. King gave it to Kalaeokekoi during Mahele. John Young does not know
 of Stevenson's interest in the land.
